The Historical and Orthodox Saint Valentine

Now a commercialized holiday celebrating modern Western courtship and romance, the ancient Christian origins of Saint Valentine's Day are largely forgotten. The actual Orthodox liturgical Feast Days of Valentinos (Greek)/Valentinus (Latin) commemorate two Early Christian saints, Saint Valentine the Presbyter of Rome (July 6) and Hieromartyr Valentine the Bishop of Intermna (Terni), Italy (July 30). Although the historical records for these two saints are not complete, and what we do know about their lives has often been subjected to considerable confusion, their martyrdoms are well known to us. Because of their refusal to renounce their faith in Christ, both Valentines were imprisoned, tortured, and executed around 270, during the persecution of Christians under the Roman Emperor, Claudius II.

Because they shared the same name, were contemporaries, resided near each other in central Italy, and ultimately, shared similar fates, the two Valentines' personal histories were intermingled and conflated over the centuries, producing inconsistencies and puzzlement in many accounts of their lives. What most sources indicate, however, is that Bishop Valentine was renowned during his lifetime as a healer of the sick and blind, while Valentine the Presbyter would become notable in the historical memory of Christians, originally both Eastern and Western, as a courageous steward of marriage. Indeed, because of his connection to the sacrament of marriage, it would be the latter Valentine, the Presbyter from Rome, who would serve as the inspiration for the Late Medieval Western literary foundations for what would by the nineteenth century evolve into today's popular, secular Valentine's Day.

According to the most common narrative, Presbyter Valentine, a priest in Rome, drew the ire of Emperor Claudius by ignoring the imperial ban against allowing men who had not fulfilled their military obligations to the Empire to marry. Remaining loyal to his moral commitment and beliefs as a Christian priest, Valentine refused to compromise the sanctity of marriage to the will of the state. In defiance of imperial edict, Valentine continued to unite and bless Christian couples, which were legally barred from marrying. This association with young Christian beloveds became the muse over several centuries for an increasingly fictionalized, romantic expropriation and reconstruction of Saint Valentine in the West, one that has led to the modern Saint Valentine's Day. Indeed, the memory of Saint Valentine became so distorted and uncertain over the centuries, that the Roman Catholic Church ended its commemoration and veneration—traditionally associated with mid-February in the West—of him as a calendar saint in 1969, effectively surrendering the historical Valentine to his appropriation and exploitation by Western popular culture.

As in other matters of reverence and faith, the Orthodox Church's veneration of Saint Valentine remains immutable. Secularization in the West accounts in large part for the Papacy's move to discard the memory of Saint Valentine's martyrdom in the face of commerce and frivolity, but Orthodoxy still honors Saint Valentine, the Presbyter from Rome, for his martyrdom—and as for all its saints, the Orthodox Church honors St. Valentine as a model of the life in Christ.

For Orthodox Christians, Saint Valentine's Day is most fully understood as a celebration of romantic love and of God's love. Indeed, Valentine was willing to sacrifice his life not for Eros but in order to sanctify and make whole the union of young couples through the blessing of God's love. Demonstrating our love for God and reaching our fulfillment in Christ through our relationships with our spouses, families, and communities, is a way of life that is at the heart of Orthodoxy. By living a life in emulation of Christ, Saint Valentine shared this fundamental truth of Orthodox Christianity with the world, one that is more beautiful and lasts longer than flowers and cards—it is eternal.

SATURDAY OF SOULS (PSYCHOSAVATO)

Traditionally, the Orthodox remember the dead on a Saturday, the day Christ lay in his tomb. Four times a year parishioners assemble to pray for all their deceased loved ones. These general memorial services, known as Saturday of Souls (Psychosavato) take place the two Saturdays that precede the beginning of Great Lent, the First Saturday of Great Lent, and the Saturday before the Feast of Pentecost. There is a popular belief that departed souls come back to earth at Easter and return the day after Pentecost.

If you would like to offer prayers for the Orthodox Christian deceased, write their first name(s) on a slip of paper,

and the Priest will read the list toward the end of the service. Submit names only once for the first three consecutive Saturdays as the names are read even if you are not present. Put the list in an envelope with a small remuneration for the priest. You may want to bring a small bowl or platter of kollyva. A few parishioners also bake prosforo.

Following the service all the kollyva is combined, symbolizing the mixing of souls in heaven. Parishioners share the kollyva and greet each other with, "O Theos na tous anapafsi" ("May God forgive the souls of the dead.")



WHEAT TRAY FOR MEMORIAL SERVICES

(KOLLYVA)

- 4 cups (2 pounds) shelled wheat 1/2 cup granulated sugar 1 1/2 cups finely chopped walnuts
- 1 1/2 slivered almonds
- 1 cup pine nuts
- 2 cups white raisins
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 2teaspoons coriander
- 2 teaspoons cumin
- 2 1/2 cups powdered sugar
- 2 cups zwieback toast, ground fine

Optional: Seeds of one pomegranate and 1 cup chopped fresh parsley.

Decoration: Whole blanched almonds without skins, white candied almonds, large silver dragees, white paper doilies.

Cover the wheat with 2 quarts of water and soak overnight. Drain and rinse. Cover with 4 quarts of water in a large heavy pot and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer uncovered several hours, keeping the wheat covered with water and stirring occasionally, until wheat becomes puffy and tender. (Cooking time varies with time of soaking.) Drain in a colander, rinse, and drain again. Spriad the wheat out on a smooth dish towel to dry overnight. (If desired, burn a kandili beside the wheat as it dries.)


Prepare all other ingredients but do not assemble until the day of the memorial to prevent mush-like texture. On the day of the memorial light a censer and kandili while making the kollyva. Cover a large tray approximately 20"X 13" with wax paper and then paper doilies that extend over the edge about an inch and a half. Combine all the ingredients except the powdered sugar, zwieback crumbs, and decorations. Put combined mixture on a tray and mold into a heaping mound toward the center, pressing it smooth. Spread crumbs evenly over the top, making sure the wheat is thoroughly covered, and press down. (This layer keeps the wheat mixture from bleeding through to the top layer of powdered sugar.) Sift powdered sugar over the mound and press smooth with wax paper. Make a cross in the center with large silver dragees. With blanched almonds form the initial of the first name of the deceased on the left side of the cross, and the initial of the last name on the right, preferably using greek letters. Decorate the edges as desired

Take the kollyva to church where it will be placed on a small table by the icon of Christ at the ikonostasion. If the talbe does not have candles, put one or three in the kollyva to be lit during the memorial service. After the service, put about 1/4 cup of kollyva in a small cup for distribution to parishioners.

The ingredients have symbolic meaning: wheat for everlasting life, faisins for sweetness, pomegranate seeds for plenty, powdered sugar for the sweetness of heaven, and parsley for the green of the earth.

For Psychosavato: make one-fourth of the above recipe. (Note that the cooking time for the wheat may be reduced.) Put the kollyva in a bowl or on a small plate. Decorate the top with a cross and border design, not initials

of the deceased since kollyva for Saturday of Souls is generally made for more than one person. Put a candle in the kollyva. Take it to church where it will be placed on the memorial table with the kollyva from other parishioners. At the end of the service, all the plates of kollyva are combined in a large bowl and distributed. In Greece parishioners pinch killyva from each other's dish, mixing it by hand.

There are many recipes for Kollyva with subtle variations in each one. While time consuming, the actual process is not difficult. I boil the wheat typically for about 2 hours early Saturday morning, then spread on a sheet to dry throughout the day, then cover w/ paper towel and plastic wrap and refrigerate overnight.. I do not recommend using a towel for drying due to lint sticking to the wheat. I assemble the kollyva early Sunday morning and deliver to church by the start of 9 am Orthros.

I encourage you make this if you have not done so before, and feel free to ask an experienced parishioner for advice. ~ AP





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FELLOWSHIP NEWS – MARCH, 2016

Our February meeting took place at the Hellenic Center on Thursday, February 11, 2016 at 11:30 AM. Following a blessing by Father Theodore, we enjoyed a delicious lunch of dolmathes, salad and dessert. We then held our business meeting where we discussed potential trips we might make in future months. We also voted to donate \$100 each to both the church and to Philoptochos as reimbursement for the leftover festival and/or coffee hour food we have consumed, as well as the paper goods and coffee we use during our luncheons. After our meeting was concluded, we enjoyed listening to both Greek and American background music (thank you Dom!) while playing a fun game of scrabble. For Greek Orthodox Christians, the 2016 Lenten fasting period begins during the month of March. Meat fare Sunday falls on March 6th and after this date, no meat is allowed until Pascha. Cheese fare Sunday falls on March 13th, and is the last day that cheese, eggs or other dairy products can be consumed. Cheesefare Sunday is also called Forgiveness Sunday, indicating the desire for God's forgiveness that lies at the heart of Great Lent. At Vespers on Sunday evening, all the people ask forgiveness of one another, and thus Great Lent begins.

Following this first Vesper service of the Paschal season on March 13th, our parish of St. George will host a reception for the local clergy and other Orthodox churches who will participate. The Fellowship group encourages all St. George parishioners to be generous in your donation of a Lenten food item when asked, to attend this beautiful service, and to welcome all our friends in attendance from the other Orthodox churches.

Our March Fellowship meeting will take place on March 10, 2016 at 11:30 AM at the Hellenic Center. Since this date falls after meat fare Sunday, our lunch will be meatless. Cheese, however, is allowed during that week, so the menu for our lunch on the 10th will consist of a three cheese penne casserole, Greek salad, crusty peasant bread, dessert and coffee.

As always, we continuously encourage newcomers to join our group. Unless there is a special occasion when we travel or meet at a restaurant, our typical meetings take place at the Hellenic Center on the second Thursday of every month at 11:30 AM. We always begin our meetings with a meal. We charge a nominal fee of \$3 for members and \$5 for non-members to cover the cost of the food. Dues are \$25 annually.
