Membership in the Philoptochos Society is open to all Greek Orthodox faithful and their spouses.

The Ladies Philoptochos Society wishes everyone a healthy and happy New Year!

Since our last bulletin, we celebrated another successful Spaghetti Dinner Fundraiser. Thank you to all of the members who donated goods and services to making the event a joyful success! We also thank our community for supporting this major fundraiser for the chapter. Here are some of the ways we distribute those funds: each year, we ask our Parish Priest to select a charity of his choosing to receive a donation of support from our organization. This year, Fr. Neofitos chose **Luv Michael**, a non-profit 501 c3 dedicated to training, educating, and employing autistic adults and improving the lives of the autistic community beyond the lives of their parents. Locally, and during the month of November we made donations to WGY Christmas Wish, YWCA Battered Women's Shelter, **Evangeline Booth Miracle Home, Schenectady County Social Services Families in need, Gifts & visits to Nursing Home and Homebound members and St. Basil's Academy.** We also made donations to the **Ecumenical Patriarchate**, **National Sisterhood of Presbyteras Benevolent Fund, UNICEF, General Medical Fund, and St. Michael's Home**.

Here is what Philoptochos accomplished on a National level in 2023

- 19th Biennial Philoptochos *Children's Medical Fund Luncheon* Celebrates Unprecedented Success in Philanthropy for Children's Health, raising an astonishing over **\$550,000** dedicated to the health and happiness of needy children! More than **\$348,738** was disbursed in grants, a testament to the strong support for organizations championing the cause of improving children's lives.
- \$25,000 allocated to *IOCC* to Assist Greece in the Face of Fires and Floods.
- \$10,000 *Emergency Funds* Allocated to Maui Greek Orthodox Mission and National Philoptochos to Further Help Wildfire Relief.
- Philoptochos Contributes \$250K Turkey Earthquake Relief Efforts in Collaboration with GOA and IOCC.
- National Philoptochos Approved \$50,000 in *Emergency Funding* in Response to the Devastating Earthquake in Turkey and Syria.
- **Project Review Grants** totaling \$74,276. These grants underscored the organization's commitment to making a tangible difference in communities nationwide. The diverse range of projects funded speaks to the versatility and impact of Philoptochos initiatives.
 - Marklund Children's Home, Elgin, IL The program allowed them to purchase medical equipment for breathing needed at their Wasmond Center located in Elgin, IL, for individuals with profound disabilities under long-term care. \$22,947
 - Boston Children's Hospital, Boston, MA The program, Improving Continence for Patients with Bladder Exstrophy, assists children with a rare congenital condition that involves the bladder and urethra, \$25,200
 - New York-Presbyterian Hospital, New York, NY The program, Providing Comfort to Mothers and Babies with Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS), assists and provides take-home comfort kits for babies in the NICU that were born by mothers with addiction and substance abuse, mostly opiates, \$11,129
 - Orthodox Volunteer Corps, Pittsburgh, PA The program was established in 2021 as part of the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the US's task force for the Year of the Youth. Funds would be used for 3 retreats for full-time volunteers: orientation, mid-year, and final, \$15,000

You can see that Philoptochos is quite an amazing organization to be part of, and we appreciate each day God gives to us that we can be in service to those in need. Customarily, our local chapter holds no business meeting during the month of December, but we met many times over the month for liturgy, religious study, and to enjoy a holiday luncheon. Also, the December 5th Soup Kitchen was sponsored by Ifigenia T. Brown in loving memory of *Paul Brown* and *Angela Theodore*.

From the desk of Fr. Neofitos

Σήμερον τῶν ὑδάτων, ἁγιάζεται ἡ φύσις[.] Today the waters are made holy and thus all nature, for the Master is washed in the Jordan.

What is our vision for the future of Saint George? What service can we offer back to God? What can we offer His people? This Christmas and Theophany, we pray God's light brings us these answers. He has blessed us with many beautiful families and youth these last few months. A booming Greek school and a new Sunday School with an awesome staff and school board. Let us attend these great feasts in gratitude for all He blesses us with.

The **Holy Theophany** or Epiphany of our Lord is a great holiday! Theofania means God revealed Himself for the first time. The Holy Trinity, Father, the voice from Heaven, The Son, Jesus in the Jordan river, and the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove. Epiphany is the event that Jesus began His 3-year ministry and revealed Himself as the Christ, the Son of Man, the Son of God.

Historically, Christmas and Theophany where the first holidays of the year and were considered New Year celebrations. From our Lord's baptism, the whole world was sanctified and thus the church took on its form. The saints of our church are those who followed our Lord and believed in Him that salvation comes from above, not from this Earth. During this season we also celebrate many of these saints and have their shining example as a beacon of hope to follow for a path to the kingdom. We celebrate all together, living, reposed, saints and angels with the Lord forever, as our prayers say.

St. Neophytos, my saint, is one such saint celebrated on January 21st. He was a pious child and was martyred for Christ when he was 15 years old. He is an inspiration for us and of course for our children. Pious parents make for pious children. Purity, simplicity, humility, and compassion were Some of Saint Neophytos' key virtues.

St. Neophytos worked two miracles of compassion at the young age of nine. Feeding the hungry was always in his heart. Once, as some young children were gathering to look for food in the streets, the Saint was sad that he had no food to give them. He prayed to the Almighty God and in HIS name came forth gushing out water and milk from a boulder just like Moses in the dessert.

Later that year, a dove appeared above his bed it is depicted also in his icon on his shoulder, and it spoke to his mother. In shock at hearing a human voice come from the bird, Neophytos' mom fainted and died. Friends and family were deeply saddened and gathered to console the family but - the saint had no fear.

He believed that the Lord would grant his mother life again. He told his father to ask everyone to leave. He knelt and invoked the Lord Jesus Christ's name and with his fervent prayer told his mother to GET UP from her sleep. And indeed, she rose. Few saints have performed such a miracle. The resurrection of his mother caused a great commotion and many flocked to come meet this wondrous child. The young man was instructed by the angelic bird to go and dwell in a cave on Mount Olympus to live as a hermit. This way he could also keep his family free of harm and not attract extra attention lest they be discovered as Christians. During this time in history, it was illegal to be a Christian.

Arriving at the cave, the Saint found a lion and very tenderly asked him to leave so he can live there. And miraculously the lion was obedient. The saint was fed by God, and he found peace and tranquility. As he matured, he returned home to ask his parents to sell his possessions and inheritance and give it to the poor. In his 15th year of life, he came down once again from the mountain and answered the call of martyrdom.

At that time, Governor Maximian was a fierce anti-Christian ruler. He walked into the arena and proclaimed he was a Christian. Enraged, the governor made sure he underwent many tortures. He tried to make an example of him. However, it was Neophytos who showed everyone the power of our Lord. Nothing would harm or kill the young man. They even tried to feed him to a lion. Once the lion was unleashed, it approached the Saint and started playing with him as if it was a puppy. Our Lord who is God of heaven and earth had so connected Saint Neophytos to nature that even this wild animal became docile at his command. It was the same lion from the cave from years before. St. Neophytos' life ended when Maximian speared him in the heart with prideful rage.

For us today, saints' lives can be an inspiration. I pray his purity, simplicity, humility, bravery, and philanthropic compassion help us draw near to the Glory of our Lord. Our children need to be offered to the Lord so they can learn the ways of God. The offering of our time and resources includes offering our families to our church. The future of the church of Christ depends on us. Our beautiful space here is hungry for youth activity. Most importantly, our youth need to be in a Christian space with other families which share the same God-fearing values. The Orthodox path begins in this life and more specifically in church. We pray God moves us to action and to attentiveness.

Liturgical Offerings

Prayer Requests- (Υπέρ Υγείας – Health & Υπέρ Αναπαύσεως – Reposed)

is kept in the tabernacle.

Also known as: Names for prayers for the living and reposed or Dyptichs. During the Divine Liturgy, the names of our loved ones are commemorated for their health and salvation and for the repose of the departed. First names are written only in 2 separate sheets or columns labeled for the living and for the reposed.



Prosforo- In addition to names, we may also offer the Prosforo. Prosforo means offering in Greek. It is a small loaf of leavened bread used in the Divine Liturgy. After the consecration of the holy gifts, the main piece called "the lamb" becomes the body of Christ. He is the Lamb of God which is offered for the salvation of the world.



Communion Wine - This is usually a Greek sweet wine. Mavrodafni or Byzantino Nama, or Commandaria are some of the types and brands of wines that churches use.



Incense – From the time of Moses, God taught us an offering of charcoal and incense is pleasing to the Lord and fills the room just as the Holy Spirit does.

Koliva – This is a memorial plate that can be offered for the reposed along with a Trisagion service or Memorial service. This is boiled wheat mixed with different ingredients. It symbolizes everlasting life and is based on a Bible verse, John 12:24, which reads: "...unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit." Koliva for saints can be offered as well.

Artoklasia – This is a sweet bread (5 loaves) that is offered as a prayer for the living. Artoklasia is usually offered for the Feast Day of a Saint or Nameday. It is offered with communion wine and Extra Virgin Olive Oil. These are 5 loaves which symbolize the miracle of multiplying the Fish and bread.



We can bring these items ourselves as an offering or they can be provided for you by order. Offerings to God are blessings that are reaped by us. Our Lord blesses our offerings, even though imperfect, He blesses them, transforms them, and returns them to us for our transformation. It is a spiritual exchange which perpetuates our personal relationship with God. Our salvation and our Liturgical actions are linked. Our Faith must be lived and this takes action. These are just some of the actions our Lord has guided us to take for our path of the Cross. His entrance into this world is one of the

greatest expressions of His love. Let us be grateful for the infinite opportunities we have to express our gratitude for all He has given us. We pray to see everyone at our many worship opportunities throughout the months of November and December. We are the ones in need of these offerings and of receiving His grace and illumination.

HOUSE BLESSINGS

It is a distinct blessing, each year during the season of Holy Theophany, for all Orthodox Christians to have their homes and places of business blessed by their priest. The yearly blessing of homes at the Feast of the Theophany touches our daily lives with the sanctifying water in which our Lord was baptized. In blessing a home, the Church asks God to drive away every evil influence from our home and those who live in it, and to renew with extra vigor the influence of the Holy Spirit in our homes and lives. The Fathers speak of the Christian home as a little church, and just as we chase away the influences of the evil one from our parish, so too must we do in our own family.

How to Prepare for a Home / Business Blessing

In preparing for a house blessing, the following should be noted:

1. A quiet and reverent environment: Turn off the television and radio before the priest arrives. Assemble all the family and friends in the home around the kitchen or wherever an icon is prepared for the occasion. When the priest arrives, turn off our phones.

2. Prepare the table: For the house blessing, the priest will require the following: An icon, a lit candle, a censer, a small, clean bowl for holy water, and a sprig of basil. (if possible)

Troparion of Theophany several times:

When Thou, O Lord, wast baptized in the Jordan, the worship of the Trinity was made manifest!
For the voice of the Father bore witness to Thee, and called Thee His beloved Son!
And the Spirit, in the form of a dove, confirmed the truthfulness of His word.
O Christ our God, Who hast revealed Thyself and hast enlightened the world, glory to Thee!
