

From the desk of Fr. Neofitos

"Behold, The Man" (Pilate)

Welcome all to the Triodion period. It is a period that spans from the Sunday of the Publican and Pharisee until Holy Saturday and the Resurrection of our Lord.

It is also the service book we use during this period and it contains multiple daily services for this 11-week period. The main theme of the Triodion is repentance. In summary, it is about our return to the "Kingdom"



prepared for us". The hymns and prayers constantly refer to humanities' repentant journey spanning from Adam and Eve's exile out of Eden, all the way to our reentry into Paradise and the Kingdom of Heaven through our Lord's loving sacrifice, passion, death, resurrection, and glorious second coming. This period is filled with services, service to our fellow man in need (almsgiving), fasting, personal prayer, reading, and the sacrament of confession, and holy unction.

Our God is a good God and He loves us. Even if we feel we are far away from Him, He awaits patiently and lovingly for our return. He is waiting for us, always, with His arms outstretched, as we see in the icon of the Crucifixion. Christ is giving us a hug with His loving sacrifice for the remission of our sins and for eternal life.

Our Creator yearns for us. Let us look at the parable of the Prodigal Son which summarizes our return to God. Jesus speaks of a Father who split his inheritance among his sons. The younger took his inheritance early and squandered it with prodigal living. He did not do anything wise with it. He wasted his money. For us today this could symbolize when we waste our time, talent, treasures, or any time we sin. The son ran out of wealth and then, famine struck. He ended up working with pigs and he ate their food.

Great Lent is a reminder to repent. It is our opportunity to self-reflect and see where we are "eating with the swine" and have a repentant moment and turn our behavior and energies toward returning

to God. In the rest of the story, we see the repentance of the younger son. You might have heard the story many times before.

I would like to point out the different steps of repentance in this parable so that we can apply them to our lives.

Step one is to admit we are a sinner. It says, "But when he came to himself. Eig $\epsilon \alpha u \tau \dot{o} v \Delta \epsilon \epsilon \lambda \theta \dot{\omega} v \epsilon i \pi \epsilon$ " He was living with pigs and then had an AHA moment. He snapped out of it. He realized he was not being HIMSELF. His best self.

"My father's servants have food to spare but I am sitting here hungry, starving. I will arise and go to my father. And I will say "I have sinned against heaven and before you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son. Treat me as one of your hired servants." The admission is the first step. Looking in the mirror and realizing that maybe we muddied ourselves with some of our behaviors. Where have I muddied my baptismal robe, the white radiant robe of my soul? And he arose and came to his father. Step two is action, confession, or admission of guilt. Asking for forgiveness.

Our sins are not forgiven with our own prayer but by the Grace of God through the sacrament of the priesthood within Holy Confession which Jesus established.

Our God has left us a living breathing church for our healing. We must use and practice the sacrament of confession. We must come to our senses and be honest with ourselves and then with God. Just like we do not lie to our doctor, we should not lie to God, ourselves, or the world. The priest, who is in essence representing God and the world, under the blessing of the hierarch, offers us God's absolution of sins.

And finally, step three, changing our life and getting the job done. There is a difference between coming to the realization, speaking the realization, and taking



the steps toward acting out the change in our heart. The son acted after his realization and went back to his father. He had humble expectations and with boldness to approach, he asked for forgiveness.

What came next in the parable was a joyous occasion. The beloved father, "at a distance, saw His son – and had compassion - Μακράν απέχοντος οίδεν αυτόν ο πατήρ αυτού – εσπλαχνίσθη". The father suffered long for his son. Waiting and peering at the horizon in hope for his son's safe return. I have no pleasure in the death of a sinner, says the LORD God; but rather that he should return from his evil ways and live.

The father prayed and wept. He got on his knees for his child while he was gone. He must have made many offerings to God in supplication and mercy for his son. Our Father in heaven also prays for us. He hopes that we will run to Him when we stray from our holy path He intended for us. He never gives up hoping for us. He hopes that this world will not destroy us. He believes in us. Do we believe in Him?

When we take one step toward Him, he takes 100 toward us, just as the loving father, "Filostorgos Pateras" ran to his lost son when he returned. The core of our Lord's salvific plan, the reason He is risen, is for us to be free of our sins and death and have eternal life. Just like the Father in the parable put on his son the best robe, gave him a ring, put shoes on his feet, killed the fatted calf and had a party, in the same way we receive His eternal blessings. "My son was dead, and he is now alive. He was lost and now he is found."


Our Father is waiting for us always; Before Lent, during Lent, and after Lent. This is a time for our own self-reflection. Let us look at our behaviors, and not just fast, and pray, and give charity like the Pharisee. Let us increase our compassion, our teamwork, and not just focus on what we are giving up for Lent. We say, "Christ is in our Midst"! Our Father is here present and looking for us. He is waiting for us.

His warm embrace is not far off but HERE in our midst. His arms are outstretched on the Cross, waiting for us, ALWAYS. Let us not be mere observers, but partakers in this joy that is everlasting.

Let us bring our families into the family of God, often, this Easter of 2025. Let us boldly approach without fear of condemnation. Our St. George church is thriving and growing. We shant take these gifts for granted. We must embrace our Lord as the salvation and master of our lives.

We must show up and show up for the right reasons. The future of St. George rests in our hands and we must be passionate about our Creator and teach our children that this world alone will fail them. Our only hope is in the Lord. We are more than just earthly matter. We have a soul and we must not cut it off from the soul saver. Let us together "Behold, The Man" this Holy period and experience joy in His comforting embrace. Amen

Behold, the Bridegroom is coming in the middle of the night; and blessed is the servant He shall find awake and watching; unworthy is the other He shall find being lazy. So beware, O soul of mine, be not overcome by sleep, so that you not be handed over to death and be shut out from the Kingdom. Come to your senses and cry aloud: Holy, holy, holy are You our God. Through the Theotokos have mercy on us.



The ministries of St. George, which are reflected throughout "The Triumphant" have continued to provide spiritual growth and guidance to the parishioners with the love and support from Father Neofitos and Presvytera Catherine. As we look forward to the future, we are excited about what God has in store for our community. We believe that with support of your Time, Talents and Treasure, we can continue our ministries and reach more people with the message of love, hope and salvation. The monies received from Stewardship pledges are crucial in supporting the ministries of the Church. We have the annual Festival and fundraisers, but ultimately, those proceeds will not cover the expenses that the Church incurs throughout the year. The Parish Council

We are Conciliar

The Priest is head of the Parish and is charged with the guidance of the total Parish program. The parish council consists of the Priest, and the elected lay members, and is referred to as a board only when so required by local statute. In internal matters of the Church, we always use the designation of Parish Council. This is because one of the identifying traits of the Orthodox Church is that we are conciliar – decisions are made in council.



Setting An Example for the Parish

The duties of a parish council member (United Parish Regulations) include regular attendance at divine services and participation in the sacramental life of the Church, "...thereby setting an example for the parish." To set an example for the parish will require that we overcome the stereotype of the parish council member who is rarely seen in church. It is easy to be like Martha -- Jesus, the Son of God, came to dinner and Martha spent the entire time in the kitchen "anxious and troubled about many things".



Brian Goodale (Officer- President) is the current President of the Parish Council at St. George. Through his wife Lucy (Laskaris) Goodale, he was introduced to the Orthodox faith, and converted and was baptized shortly thereafter. Professionally, Brian works for SUNY Empire State College as the Director of Academic Partnerships in the Office of Partnerships in the Office of the President. He has been at Empire State College since 2009. Prior to Empire State College, Brian had 15 years of higher education experience, including service at the University at Albany as the Director of Graduate Admissions for the School of Public Health, and the Assistant Director of International Graduate Admissions for the university. He started his career as an Admissions Counselor at SUNY Cobleskill. In addition, Brian has 21 years of

volleyball coaching experience, including 17 years as the Head Women's Volleyball Coach at the College of Saint Rose (NCAA Division II). Brian earned his Ph.D. in Higher Education Administration at the University at Albany, where he also earned his master's degree. Greetings from the Fellowship group!

It has been a year now since we decided to reorganize and change the format of the Fellowship group. We disbanded as an official church organization with officers (President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer), we discontinued membership dues, our bank account was closed, and the balance was turned over to the church. The decision to disband came about because as we aged, the responsibilities of collecting dues, maintaining a bank account, taking notes at meetings when various decisions were made, preparing and serving our meals and cleaning up afterwards, became too tiring. We still wanted to meet regularly, however. Thus the decision was made to continue our much beloved monthly gatherings, but instead of meeting and eating at the Hellenic Center, we meet instead at various restaurants in the area. We still enjoy one another's company on a monthly basis while continuing to support the church through our work.

The months of March and April bring us both the beginning of Lent on Monday, March 3rd, and the vernal equinox (the first day of Spring) on March 20. For the rest of March and throughout most of April, we will be in the midst of Great Lent. During this time and throughout the 40-day period of Lent, we prepare for Easter with prayer, abstinence, fasting and the sacrament of confession. What a beautiful and touching way to remember our beloved family members who have passed from this world. This year Orthodox Easter falls on Sunday, April, 20, 2025, the same day as Western Easter.

Each year on the Sunday evening before the start of Holy Lent (also known as Forgiveness or Cheesefare Sunday) our church hosts a reception for all those who attend the vesper service that evening. The custom of this service is to ask for forgiveness and to forgive one another. Many of our Fellowship members will be involved with the reception following the vesper service, either donating food or working to set up, receiving food items, and/or clean up afterwards. The Lenten foods we offer may not contain meat of any kind. However, fish, cheese and dairy items are permitted. Thus, we will have a wide range of wonderful food options available, from appetizers to entrees to desserts. We look forward to continuing the tradition of St. George being the most well attended of the local Orthodox parishes who participate in the Sunday Lenten series. Thank you to all our parishioners and Fellowship members who work so hard to make this reception such a huge success every year! This year we will have a special quest speaker, Paul Finley from the Orthodox Christian Prison Ministry. We look forward to hearing from Mr. Finley about the important work being done to bring Orthodoxy to men and women who are incarcerated within the prison system. His talk promises to be a fascinating and enlightening experience for us all!



THE ICONS OF ST. GEORGE

The Icon Project began in the Winter of 2023. Thanks to our many generous donors, the church acquired 80+ new icons of the Saints and the Feast Days commemorating the life of Jesus Christ and the Theotokos. All of the new icons are uniform in size and are reproductions made by the Sisters at Holy Protection Monastery of the Theotokos (Agia Skepi) in White Haven, Pennsylvania.

The majority of these new icons are located on ledges in the room adjacent to the altar while many have been placed inside the altar itself. On the day of commemoration, the icon is placed in the church and oftentimes framed with beautiful fresh flowers.


The Icon Book began with a simple question. How can we highlight the icons themselves and also identify the donors and memorialization for future generations? Thus, the idea of creating a permanent record was born. Now, every icon in the church is documented on individual certificate pages. Each page contains a photograph of the icon, the name of the donor, the names of those "In Memory Of" or "In Honor Of", and the date the saint or feast day is commemorated.

We then took it one step further by including the icons located on the rear wall of the church. These large icons are permanently affixed to the wall and are originals that were painted at the Holy Monastery of Virgin Mary the Consolatory in Brownsville, Quebec, Canada.

Finally, we discovered a hand drawn schematic of the church interior depicting the iconostasis, the Royal Doors and veil, the icons on the north and south walls of the church and the Bishop's Throne. This document also lists the names of the donors dating back to 1939 when construction of our present-day church was finished after a fire destroyed the original church in 1937. It was fitting this be included to make our book complete.

The book Icons of St. George will be kept in the side room off the sanctuary in front of the large icon of Holy Archangel Michael and surrounded by the beautiful icons depicted inside its covers. Located in the front part of the book is a Dedication Page, Index of Icons, and Alphabetical List of Donors which includes the name(s) of their icons and the section where they are located. As you peruse the pages within, you will see up close and in detail the beautiful icons which now adorn St. George Church.

To complete the project, a beautiful hand carved wooden icon stand was purchased to hold the book. We express our heartfelt gratitude to all the generous donors who made this possible.
