

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." (Matthew 28:18)


"Whoever eats My flesh and drinks My blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day." (John 6:54)

Why Confession?

(Any time by appointment and before or after services)

Confession is a vital sacrament of our Church. It is where we bring our sins before God, in the presence of a priest, and receive forgiveness, healing, and renewal through prayer.


We come to confession:

- For the forgiveness of sins
- For life everlasting
- For cleansing of soul and body
- To begin or deepen a spiritual relationship with a spiritual father

Sometimes confession is avoided or forgotten. Yet the devil works hardest to keep us from what is most powerful for our salvation. Through confession, the weight of sin is lifted, our soul is cleansed, and we are prepared to receive the other sacraments—especially Holy Communion.

As the Lord says: "I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but that the wicked turn from his way and live." (Ezekiel 33:11)

Christ waits with open arms—come and be renewed!



Why Holy Communion?

(Received at every Divine Liturgy)

Holy Communion is the greatest gift of our Orthodox faith—the Body and Blood of our Lord, God, and Savior Jesus Christ. It unites us with Christ Himself and with one another as His Body, the Church.

We receive Communion:

- For eternal life
- For the forgiveness of sins
- For healing of soul and body
- For strength to live as Christians
- For union with Christ and His Church

As the Lord teaches: "Whoever eats My flesh and drinks My blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day." (John 6:54)

To approach this holy mystery, we prepare through prayer, fasting, and regular confession. Holy Communion is not a symbol but truly the Body and Blood of Christ, given "for the remission of sins and life everlasting." Come with faith, love, and reverence—receive Christ, and live!

On Tuesdays, weekly throughout the year, starting on September 23, 2025 at 5:30 pm, we will be praying this beautiful service. This is a service for the living, and we offer prayers for the entire world. This is where names of Orthodox and non-Orthodox can be submitted for commemoration. The prayers are intercessory to the Virgin Mary asking for her to ask her Son and our God Jesus Christ to heal our ailing souls and bodies.

On select Tuesdays, after Paraklesis service, we remain in the church for class. This year we are continuing our review of the four gospels using The Synopsis of The Four Gospels as well as our Orthodox Study Bible. Reviewing the parallel accounts of all four gospel writers will give us insight to the writers' point of view, motivation, target audience, main messaging, etc... God's Providence and Will can be awarded to us as we drink of the Living water, Jesus Christ. Sometimes we host other guest priests visiting who guide our gathering.

A synopsis is a book which puts the Synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke...also John) in columns, so that one can see more readily the agreements, disagreements, omissions, changes, etc. amongst them. Really good synopses try to integrate the Gospel of John as well. This is a good synopsis.

We are ordering the bibles soon so please let us know if you need an Orthodox Study Bible (\$40) and The Synopsis of The Four Gospels (\$40).

Learning how to apply the bible, our faith, and the law of God in this world is a guiding theme of this gathering. Our participants have made this program very enjoyable and of course, delicious at times with their offering of food.


History of Ladies Philoptochos Society Soup Kitchen Ministry

"...for I was hungry and you gave me food ...

...inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me"

Matthew 25: 35-40



Fast forward 25 years later, when we were blessed to have Charlie and Kathy Koines take over the leadership of Soup Kitchen. They brought it to an entirely new level. Charlie, our head chef, purchased the food and prepared the meal in the Hellenic Center kitchen along with his excellent team – Mike Euripidou, Pete Kalil, Steve Giakoumis and Phil McGowen. Charlie expanded the menu and soon we were serving Greek Chicken Florentine and Greek Goulash accompanied by sides of fresh vegetables. While the boys were cooking, Kathy organized a second team of St. George volunteers who prepared the rest of the meal at the Salvation Army. The hot food was transported from the church to the Salvation Army and everyone stayed to serve the meal from 12:00-1:00 pm.

Needless to say, when COVID hit in March 2020, everything came to a halt. Our church services were virtual and in person Philoptochos meetings did not resume until the Fall. Even then, we were limited to socially distant activities. We learned the Salvation Army could no longer serve in-house meals, instead providing food to go. We felt it important this ministry be continued, but how to do it in a safe way. Beginning in October 2020, the Bag Lunch model was put in place. The Salvation Army asked Philoptochos to provide them with 75 complete bag lunches, meeting specific nutritional requirements, once a month. It would take two days each month for our Soup Kitchen Bag Lunch team (Olga Delorey, Gladys Paravalos, Eliana Georgelos and Dina Nikolaidis) to do the shopping, prepare the perishable items, fill the bags and deliver them to the Salvation Army by 8:45 am. This arrangement continued through June of 2025. After five years, however, the reality of our limitations and the physical demands became apparent. We reinvented the Soup Kitchen ministry once before and we will do it again.

Starting in September 2025, the Philoptochos and Salvation Army will launch a new initiative. We are moving into a more administrative stance in support of this ministry. Actually, this "new" arrangement is a throwback to when we first began. After meeting with the Salvation Army Social Services Manager, it was agreed, and with the gracious support of Mike Euripidou and Pete Kalil, their staff will learn how to prepare nutritious Greek inspired meals for their consumers. Mike and Pete will cook a hot entrée (protein, starch, vegetable) in the Salvation Army kitchen for an average of 75 people each month, and the staff will "shadow" them during meal preparation. The staff will serve and clean up, thereby eliminating the person power that was required by our members over these many years. In addition, the Salvation Army has agreed to secure all food items which will eliminate the tasks of shopping, preparation and delivery which became a great burden for the Philoptochos Soup Kitchen team over this past year.

Through the generosity of our sponsors, Philoptochos will fund the meal as we have done since its inception. Meals are sponsored in memory of loved ones, and a Trisagion Service is performed by Father Neofitos on the Sunday preceding the Soup Kitchen meal. If you are interested in more information on becoming a sponsor, please speak with Olga Delorey, Soup Kitchen Chair. A limited number are available each year.

Everyone is excited about this new approach, and it offers many solutions to challenging circumstances for our Philoptochos and the Salvation Army.

Our heartfelt thanks to EVERYONE who has supported this vital ministry over the decades. May God bless you for all you have done in the name of Philoptochos and feeding the hungry.

Why Philoptochos?

St. George Philoptochos



We are the arm of the church that

- serves the poor, the destitute, the hungry, the aged, the sick, the unemployed, the orphaned, the imprisoned, the widowed, the handicapped, the victims of disasters, to undertake the burial of impoverished persons and to offer assistance to anyone who may need the help of the Church through fundraising efforts.
- promotes the charitable, benevolent, and philanthropic purposes of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America, through instructional programs, presentations, lectures, seminars and other educational resources.
- preserves and perpetuates Orthodox Christian concepts and the Orthodox Christian Family, and through them, to
 promote the Greek Orthodox Faith and traditions, in accordance with its doctrines, canons, discipline, divine
 worship, usages and customs.
- promotes participation in the activities of the Greek Orthodox community, with the cooperation of the Parish Priest and the Parish Council. Why Philoptochos? Why not?

CHOIR

Why the choir? Participating in divine worship services as a choir member is a sacred responsibility, not to be taken lightly. Choir members, as other church musicians, offer their God-given talents to the faith for a variety of reasons. For most, it is a part of their stewardship – the giving of their "time and talents". For others, it is something that is enjoyed and for still others, it is a social outlet. In Orthodox services, choir members represent the laity, responding to the liturgical dialogue set by the priest. This places a sacred responsibility on them during our worship services. They are called to be knowledgeable not only of the hymns and responses, but also about the correct order of the worship services. The choir is entrusted to be a participating part of the worship service, and its members must respond to the trust accordingly.

There are various aspects of being a choir member – most importantly, there is a liturgical role and, of course, there is a musical role. The music of the Orthodox Church is an integral part of worship services. Choral music must add to the liturgy, not distract from the prayerful environment of worship. The clergy stand in the place of Christ in creating the Liturgy as "heaven on earth". They are the leaders and the ones who are celebrants of the mysteries of God, who is their Author. Those who sing represent the angels, who stand around His throne offering Him hymns of praise.

Not all choir members are or need to be trained musicians, able to read music or have experience singing with a group. However, even with "amateurs" and "volunteers", choir members can grow in their knowledge of music and create a sound that matches the beauty of our services and their surroundings – the music, the chanting, the icons, the vestments all strive to be as perfect and beautiful as possible as we offer up worship to God.






